Job Description: NCBA Wildlife District Representative (WDR); and Local Chapter Coordinator (LCC)

The NCBA Wildlife District Representative (WDR) position really doesn't involve a lot of time and work. The duties of the Local Chapter Coordinator (LCC), or Local Chapter Rep (LCR) as is often referred to, are much the same, except the LCC deals primarily with members of the local chapter club he/she belongs to, as well as the general hunting public as the occasion arises.

Here's a short list of duties and obligations involved with being a NCBA WDR (or LCC) Representative:

Attend the WRC Public Input Meetings in September.
 There's one in each wildlife district. Take notes on comments made from the audience by other sportsmen/women and send an e-mail report to us that evening or next

day with anything of importance to NCBA.

- 2. Help monitor bills in the N.C. Legislature. (This can be done "online.") Notify the NCBA Legislative Chairman and President of any new legislation you hear about; or report the current status of existing bills to E.C. officers.
- On occasion, you may be asked to randomly contact NCBA members in your district and ask them questions about their opinion on various issues. You will be supplied with a roster of NCBA members in your district when necessary, or upon request.
- 4. Talk to hunters and sportsmen/women about NCBA anytime the occasion arises. Be a good ambassador for bowhunting and NCBA whenever and wherever the occasion and opportunity arises. If someone has a misconception about NCBA and what we stand for and what we are working to accomplish, do your best to explain our position on any issues they may be concerned with.
- 5. NCBA WDR and LCC members have the same status as "Associate Council" members in the NCBA. Thus, they have voting privileges at our Executive Council meetings on all issues brought before the E.C. in matters of general business. WDR's and LCC's from each local chapter club should make an effort to attend E.C. meetings when possible, especially the January meeting, as this is the most important E.C. meeting each year. If the designated LCC from a local chapter club cannot attend an E.C. meeting, a temporary substitute LCC may attend in his/her place. It is our hope that every club has someone who attends all E.C. meetings to represent them.

It is a good idea that all NCBA officers/reps, and NCBA members, read our constitution and bylaws at least once a year so we all will be well versed in it's content. Many people are also interested in our record system and BCRS program as well as the insurance benefits for individual members and clubs. Familiarize yourself with our Bylaws; Record System, BCRS program, NCBA insurance benefits and all NCBA programs, so you can talk about them with confidence. (Remember that we may only give a general overview of the BCRS program and how it works. We cannot disclose the identity of any of our BCRS clients.)

Letter from Afghanistan

When I first joined the military in 2009, I was stationed at Ft. Bragg with U.S. Army Airborne Infantry. I felt lucky where I was, only an hour and a half from my home town of Kernersville, which made it possible for me to come home nearly every weekend and spend time with family and friends. I felt especially lucky for that when it was deer season.

In 2011, I shot a 9pt on an early morning in October. I had returned home late the prior evening from the work week at Fort Bragg, and once I got there I raced to the woods so I could hang a set that I could hunt the following morning. I set up across from a nice row of white oaks dropping acorns, where I had seen many deer the year before, along with several of the biggest rubs I'd ever come across. At about 9am a big 8 fed in with two smaller bucks. I watched them feed through, and was about ready to take the 8 when I saw a bigger 9 cross the cut. So I waited out for him. He came in to about 20 yards, munching acorns, and when he turned towards me, he threw his nose up at the sky. I thought he had winded me and we had a pretty intense stare down after that.


He eventually dropped his head to the ground and continued feeding, and getting closer to me. He made his way to my tree and just past it, then turned perfectly broadside at about 5 yards. I took the shot and he threw his back legs into the sky. Then he ran over a hill of pines and I didn't hear him crash, so I backed out, went home, and met up with two of my buddies. We returned to the woods about an hour later and followed the blood trail up the hill of pines and onto a flat choked with briars, where we found him piled up. To date, he's my biggest deer harvested and on a great mount, thanks to a local taxidermist.



Two months later I was spending Christmas day with the family, watching movies, while Mom cooked up a big Christmas meal. We ate at 3pm, which gave me plenty of time afterward to grab the bow and head off for a hunt. Before dark, I spotted two separate groups of does walking single file down into the creek bed where I sate. I took one of them at about 25 yards.

The 2012 season I spent mostly away from home traveling with my unit training and preparing to return back to Afghanistan. However, I did mange to get into the woods a few times: I took a doe back in September, and another doe and a buck a day apart in December. I've only killed one deer with a rifle; the rest have all been with my bow. You can't beat the feeling of drawing back, heart pounding, and letting an arrow fly. Those were good days, and when I get home from traveling the world with Uncle Sam,. I'm looking forward to more just like them.

This program has the potential to attract many people into our beloved sport of bowhunting and into the ranks of NCBA membership. We are also trying to gather a list of archery shops and dealers and commercial guides across North Carolina to help with this program. The shops and guides will benefit by offering their services and facilities to help train students. Most students will need to purchase bows and accessories. Matt Jenkins has volunteered to contact shop owners and he was also appointed as a District 4 NCBA Wildlife District Representative by NCBA President, Andy Smith.

Level #3 of the program takes the student to a big game hunt for deer in N.C. Guides who offer discounted hunts to students in this program stand

to gain new clients who will return to hunt with them in the future. There could be benefits for mentors too! A mentor might help someone begin hunting who would later become a lifetime hunting partner and could lead to hunting opportunities that wouldn't have been possible otherwise.

House Bill H936; "Poacher Reward Fund," to N.C. Senate Finance Committee

NCBA and N.C. House Representative John Faircloth (Dist. 61: Guilford County), submitted a bill to the N.C. General Assembly this year (House Bill #H-936) that will create a "Poacher Reward Fund". A portion of court fines and fees assessed to wildlife law violators will be designated to go into this fund to pay rewards to people who report wildlife game law violators. So, basically, the violators will, in effect, be paying the money used to pay out the rewards to the people who turned them in. That is "Justice" in its purest form! The bill has passed the House committees and was in the Senate Finance committee at the time I wrote this. It looks like this bill will become law very soon. The money to fund it will come from the very people who are violating our game laws! My sincerest thanks to Rep. Faircloth and directors of the N.C. Wildlife Federation (especially Dick Hamilton) who helped craft the wording of this bill based upon the outlines provided by the NCBA.


Finally he appeared. He was about 80 yards away when I gave my jake decoy a couple of tugs to draw him in.

Back in November, I received an email from Bridge 2 Sports requesting our help in an event called the Valor Games. I contacted Mickey Strader to see if he was up for the challenge, as always he was ready to take it on. I went to the first meeting and found out that the Valor Games had been held in Chicago for the past two years and the VA and Para Olympic committee wanted to expand the Games. The Valor Games is a Para Olympic style competition for ill or injured, active or disabled service man and woman. Bridge 2 Sports is a Durham based non-profit that focuses on introducing and supporting those with disabilities to sports of all kinds. Bridge 2 Sports wanted to blow the socks off of Chicago and was going to have two sports each day of the three day event. The event was to be held at UNC-Chapel Hill, Duke, and NC State on May 21 -23.

I sent out emails over the next few months to gather volunteers. The following were able to step up to the challenge: Mickey Strader, Russell Poole, Russell Velvin, Matt Smyth, JR Stone, Joey Stone, Kristen Rice, Ben and Linda Graham, William and Diane Newton, Crystal Smith, Tony Boykin, Wayne Smith, Marlow Townsend and Kyle Foust. Many more expressed interest, however,

with the Games being held in the middle of the week were not able to get off from work. Each month I met with Bridge 2 Sports. Mickey had backdrops made and acquired targets. Ben, Mickey, JR, Russell V. and Matt built the target stands William made arrow stands for the lanes.

All of the volunteers were trained on Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) and Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI) the evening prior to the archery segment. On the same day of our training we set up the lanes, target stands, arrow stands and backdrops. We also were able to do a quick training for our Duke student volunteers.

The day of the event, the targets went up and final instruction of how we thought it should go. Duke student volunteers helped down the side and in the back of the range to keep people from walking around the range when it was 'hot.' They were also our arrow pullers and helped our archery volunteers for whatever they needed. Diane was at the registration table with some Duke students. Russell P was our range master. Mickey was our verifier for the Para Olympics on our advance lanes. Russell V, Matt, and Marlow also helped with our advance and intermediate lanes. Crystal, Tony, Kyle, Kristen, and Joey focused on the intermediate and beginner lanes.

JR, William, and Wayne worked with our vets on the beginner lanes.

Our range officials helped vets who had never shot a bow or had not shot one since their injury. We had a few who utilized mouth tabs and a few that needed help holding their wheelchairs to stabilize them so they could hold and pull back the bow themselves. I saw smiles on all faces. We had one athlete who scored well enough to attempt the Para Olympics. Other factors may play into eligibility, but his shooting was spot on.

Bridge 2 Sports has been asked to host The Valor Games in 2014. We will need more volunteers in 2014. Our team did a fabulous job, we just need to add more to our team. Those interested, please contact me at lbrookephillips@netscape. net. It should be during the week again, it is an evening and the next day commitment. We are fed in the evening and lunch the day of the event. Other accommodations are on us. I realize we all have busy schedules. This opportunity to give back to those who have given so much is such an awesome way to say 'thank you' and to feel like we can contribute to their future. These athletes have a strong desire to compete and archery is a sport that can be adapted to those with disabilities.

NCBA LEGISLATIVE AGENDA

We solicit requests from YOU, our members, to submit your thoughts on what should be considered for our legislative agenda. We continue to solicit your comments and input about these, or other issues.

NOTE: The items listed below have been approved for our Legislative Agenda. This is the list of issues based upon YOUR input. (*NOTE: ALL items are subject to discussion and revision as time and circumstances change.) NCBA Executive Council members will continue to review any further comments from YOU, the NCBA membership. Any issues that cannot be fully agreed upon will remain on the "tentative" list for further and future discussion.

It is the Legislative Chairman, Committee, and all EC Officers duty to represent NCBA with this list, as approved by the majority of the NCBA Executive Council.

We Oppose: NCBA "Constitution & Bylaws" sets forth our position on these two issues.

- 1. OPPOSE legalization of "Crossbows" and "string-locking" devices or any apparatus that will HOLD a bow at partial or full draw, during any "Archery Only" deer seasons, except for truly legitimate handicapped, physically challenged hunters.
- 2. OPPOSE legalization of the POD, or any "Poison-Type Arrow."

We Recommend, Support or Oppose:

- 1. RECOMMEND and SUPPORT establishing a uniform schedule for opening dates of firearms deer seasons. In order to preserve, protect and proliferate the quality of our buck population, and the quality of deer hunting itself, firearms seasons (including muzzleloaders), deer firearms seasons should not open earlier than the second Saturday in November in and west of Granville, Durham, Chatham, Lee Moore, Montgomery Stanly and Anson counties; and, not earlier than the third Saturday in October in counties in and east of Vance, Franklin, Wake, Harnett, Hoke and Richmond. (Exception being the existing one week October muzzleloader season in the Western Deer Season.) We have no opposition to extending deer firearms seasons later into the winter months.
- 2. RECOMMEND and SUPPORT the adoption of a "Quality Deer Management Program." We favor adopting a regulation that would place antler restrictions based upon "Greatest Antler Width." Antlers must appear to be at least as wide as the outside "ear-to-ear" spread. Hunters would be allowed to harvest ONE buck each year that did not meet this minimum requirement. Minimum "points" per side is not desirable because: (1) It can be difficult or impossible to count points under varying light and other hunting conditions; (2) Many immature "yearling" bucks can have 3 or 4 points on one side. Antler spread is the best indicator of the age of a buck and can better be determined under most hunting conditions. (1/17/2010)
- 3. SUPPORT establishment of an archery season for black bear in eastern N.C. to run concurrent with archery deer season; or, allow "Incidental Opportunity" harvest of ONE black bear by bowhunters during any archery season.
- 4. SUPPORT a "Post-Season" bowhunting season for whitetail deer, especially does, in all sections of the state to help better control and manage deer populations; and to help achieve a lower "buck to doe" ratio in the whitetail deer population.
- 5. WE ENCOURAGE better deer management on gamelands in the Western area of the state (District 9). Our members there suggest establishment of a 2 DEER limit, one of which must be a "Trophy" buck. Antler restrictions should be implemented to define "Trophy Buck" qualifications. (See SUPPORT No. 3 above.)
- 6. SUPPORT creation of "Hunter Recognition Program" similar to WRC's "Angler Recognition Program" to recognize hunter successes. (NOTE: NCBA already has a statewide network of official measurers willing to assist with this program. Also, most WRC biologists are already B&C and P&Y certified.)
- 7. SUPPORT legislation or WRC programs designed to help recruit more youths, women and hunters of all ages into the sport of hunting, and bowhunting in particular.
- 8. SUPPORT the implementation of a "Draw "System" for all "Draw Hunts", with "Preference Points" given to unsuccessful applicants each year. This will assure that everyone who applies for "Draw Hunts" will be drawn for the hunt in a fair and equitable manner. *Rev*: 7/23/2011

It is a pleasure for me to be the NCBA Bloodtracking Program chairman. I am a life member of the NCBA and have enjoyed being a part and participating with such a good bunch of sportsman. Hope to have a lot of interest in the BTP. We will be working with the United Blood Trackers and hope to have a UBT Trackfest in NC in 2014. More on Trackfest as it becomes available.

I just returned from Trackfest 2013, Arena Wisconsin, with United Blood Trackers. It was a three day workshop all about tracking. The friendly staff for the UBT were courteous and professional and very knowledgeable, and a joy to work and learn with. It was a special honor to meet John Jeanneney, (Little John.)

The workshop consisted of classroom and field work, both of which were

very informative. The scenting conditions for the dogs were ideal. The Rock Coon Horse Club, Erderman farm was a very nice place for a Trackfest. CRP fields seem to be endless and alive with the wind. Deer were plentiful. We had plenty of Hot Tracks crossing our training lines, "very real world training." Hit site evaluation. GPS track on map training,

evaluation of different breeds and working styles of blood tracking dogs, preparing artificial training lines and training instructions from professional handlers. Custom to the handler and the dogs working speed and style. Equipment for tracking and more. We were fortune to have multiple UBT judges evaluate my dog and others during the three day workshop. On the evaluation day, my dog took test for UBT II. Would much rather track deer in a swamp or a big old cut over than to take a test. "Nervous as cat." Two years of studying books, working artificial blood lines day and night, rain or shine, with various scent conditions and every distraction I could incorporate along the way. Keeping it fun for the dog, but challenging for both of us as a team. Taking every real deer calls that came in without prejudice of type of wound inflicted and somewhere along one of those many blood lines, my dog, Mac, and I formed a bond that is hard to beat. We are a tracking team and we were UBT II certified.

Learning the anatomy of the big game animal in question and its habitat and how to communicate with hunters that need help recovering their harvest is as much a part of blood tracking as searching.

With the Lord's help this is only the beginning of learning and learning to teach others to work with a K9 as a team.

The best basic training book for blood tracking with dogs is John Jeanneney's "Tracking Dogs for Finding Wounded Deer." Another very Good Book for hunters/trackers with or without a dog, "Dead On" by John Jeanneney. To order: www.born-to-track.com is the website for United Blood Trackers.org.

The BTP web page is up and running. Feel free to contact me there with all your tracking needs, training advice, tracking equipment, local trackers, loss big game. A big thanks to all involved in making tracking with leashed tracking dog legal in N.C.

Thanks to the NCBA for being pioneers in change/education and promotion as such an ethical and useful program.

Keep in mind though it takes more than legalization to make for a tradition, that hunting and tracking are a privilege. Be an ambassador. Keep safety first.

The hot days of summer are here and I am trying to think about hunting season. From now until that magical day in September, I will be ready. For all you guys and gals that have been hunting and shooting fish my hat is off to you. It seems like as I get older the only thing I want to hunt is an air conditioned room in this 90 plus heat.

JR Stone and I attended the Big Game committee meeting on the day before the July Commissioners meeting and heard a report from biologist Evin Stanford. He was reporting on a study his committee has been conducting for the past two years. It will last one more year. The purpose of the study is test deer harvested in the nine wildlife districts across the state. The number of deer being tested is anywhere from 200 to 300 per area. After the data from the harvested deer is analyzed, the information will be presented to the Commissioners along with recommendation for season limits and season length. This is one of the most promising studies that I feel the Commission has conducted in a long time. I hope the Commissioners will listen to the biologists and act on the results of their scientific study instead of just doing what they want and what they are being pressured to do.

There was also a report on a study on the alligator population to see if the quantity is high enough to set a season in the near future. There was also a lot of talk about black bear. With Bill 352 still in legislation there was no news about changing the season, or possibly having a season in the Piedmont.

Night hunting for coyotes is still held up by a lawsuit from the Friends of The Red Wolf. The pressure from land owners who keep complaining about coyotes killing wildlife on their property continues. I hope the courts will decide soon if night hunting can restart soon.

That's the news on the WRC front for now. Soon we will learn the times and locations for the Wildlife hearings. As soon as this information is available I will pass it on. Please try to attend the meeting in your district and take a hunting partner with you. Attendance will determine whether they continue to have them.

Until the next time keep practicing and sharpening those broad heads. Opening day is just around the corner.

New State Records

Cole Miller as always seals the deal on a New Youth State Record Bowfin weighing 9 lb-4 oz. Our Saltwater Bash set 5 Records. First on the board was 8 year old Gil Weiss bowfishing with his dad Modi Weiss and Yellow Dog Charters taking a Flounder at 2 lb-5oz, then Andy Smith connected on a sheepshead at 7 lb-5oz. Cole Miller took numerous Mullet while setting the Record at 2 lb-11 oz. Conrad

Manuel was with Andy Smith when he stuck a sheepshead weighing 2 lb-12oz and a few hours later Conrad would shoot a Southern Ray that came in at 48 lb-5oz. Two weeks after the Saltwater Bash we had 3 members at the coast that would break 2 more Records. Chris Greeson would take a sheepshead at 9 lb-3oz, a Female Record would then be set by Lori Swaney with a sheepshead at 1 lb-6oz. The Saltwater Bash was a success and we had a blast. we are already planning to have it again next year. I want to give thanks to everyone who made it happen. NCBA Pres. Andy Smith, Ryan Miller, Cole Miller, Luther Manuel, Conrad Manuel, Modi Weiss, Gil Weiss, Dale Collins, Dudleys Marina, Josh Hether, Matt Cox, Logan Cox, Jason Cox, Triple C Bowfishing, Yellow Dog Charters, and Captain Josh Savage.

Measurers

Every year Pope & Young has 3 measuring schools where they invite approximately 50 measurers total between these classes so they may become Nationally Certified to measure all big game animals native to the United States. The NCBA has 21 members that have been fortunate enough to obtain this certification. This year they are only having 2 classes and I'm pleased to say we have a very active member; Mark Headen from Yadkin County that has been accepted to the Pope & Young School at their headquarters in Chatfield Minnesota. The area(District 7) that Mark lives in grows some huge deer and many of them have been accepted in the NCBA Book and Mark will fill a big void in this area. Congratulations Mark!

Potential New Category

In order for an unofficial category to become official we need to have a large number of that specific animal being turned in to the Records dept each year. In the last few years we have seen a large increase in the number of Southern Rays being turned in. I will make a recommendation to the Council and the Records Committee that we make this an Official Category in 2014. At this time the NCBA State Record and BAA World Record is held by Josh Hether at 140 lb. I look forward to announcing the news soon if this category is accepted. During the Saltwater Bash we harvested around 1000 lb of rays and we had them at our Fish Fry. I must say I was impressed with how they tasted and plan to shot more the next chance I get. If you like fried oyster, you will like Southern Rays.

As we move forward from season to season, we take for granted the regulations that are set by the NCWRC because we are so use to the dates from the seasons past. These regulations change little by little sometimes without us giving them much thought. All the sudden we are totally out in left field with our outdated information that we believe is right. The biggest change from years past is the fox seasons. Each county has set their own regulations, dates, and bag limits on the foxes and they are very different all across the state. Please be aware of all the laws of each species you hunt. You can download the fox season and regulations, county by county at newildlife.org

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
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
